Recent News

There has been a lot of talk this week about the Delta variant. This variant is
proving to be more transmissible than other strains of COVID-19 and scientists
think that it will become the dominant type of infection in the next 4-6 weeks. The
good news is that being vaccinated protects you against the most severe effects of
the Delta variant, especially after two shots. This short slide show expertly rolls

- up current information about the Delta variant and its intersection with the vaccine. Don't have Instagram? Access it here.
- In an effort to protect as many people as possible from the impact of the Delta variant, the increments between shots has been adjusted for those living or working in the Delta "hot spots." Effective June 14, second shots are being offered to adults as follows: Pfizer 21+ days, Moderna 28+ days, and Astra Zeneca 8+ weeks. The current Delta hot spot regions are Halton, Peel, Porcupine, Toronto, Wellington-Dufferin-Guelph, and York.
- Additionally, as previously announced, more and more other groups are eligible for their 2nd shots. VaxHunters has a great tool that reflects eligibility and process as of today that you can access here or here.

Children and Youth

- We are tracking the vaccination rates of 12-17-year old's and it is ah-mazing!
 Public Health Ontario reports that as of June 9, 42.9% of young people in this age group have had at least one shot, up from ~28% last week. Track the progress here.
- We encourage you to understand how your PHU is progressing on youth
 vaccinations to help you benchmark progress with the youth you work with. You
 can find your PHU's data <a href=here by selecting the tab "Vaccine Rankings" and then
 the age group you'd like to see via the drop down on the right hand side.
- You will notice vaccination "blitzes" in your area over the next two weeks in order
 to give 12+'s the opportunity to be fully vaccinated by the time school starts. Aren't
 sure why young people should be vaccinated? The folks
